FONTAGRO IS A UNIQUE COOPERATION MECHANISM AMONG LATIN AMERICAN AND CARIBBEAN COUNTRIES AND SPAIN THAT PROMOTES INNOVATION IN FAMILY FARMING, COMPETITIVENESS, AND FOOD SECURITY.

ESTABLISHED IN 1998, FONTAGRO HAS FIFTEEN MEMBER COUNTRIES, WHICH HAVE CONTRIBUTED WITH A CAPITAL THAT HAS REACHED \$100 MILLION.

THE REGION: ITS RESOURCES AND CHALLENGES

Latin America and the Caribbean have a third of the world's freshwater resources and some 28% of the world's agricultural land. The region also has the potential of becoming a major food supplier in the world. Its widely diverse geography, climate, economies, and cultures, however, pose challenges throughout all Latin American and Caribbean countries, which require more investments in agricultural research and development.

Cooperation among countries has helped generate the agricultural innovations and technologies needed to promote this potential and has strengthened national innovation systems. As farmers adopt new technologies, these enhance their income as well as their competitive options, through improvements in production and adaptation to climate change.

FONTAGRO'S MISSION:

To contribute to the innovation of family farming through cooperation among member countries, while promoting competitiveness and food security based on standards of equity and sustainability.

OUR STRATEGY

FONTAGRO brings together different organizations to improve food security and reduce poverty based on standards of equity and sustainability. In FONTAGRO's 2015-2020 medium-term plan, priorities include research and innovation through support for projects and initiatives.

- technological, organizational, and institutional innovation;
- adaptation to and mitigation of climate change;
- sustainable intensification of agriculture and natural resource management;
- competitive territories and value chains within a framework of equity and sustainability.



WHY WORK IN COLLABORATION WITH FONTAGRO?

FONTAGRO offers opportunities to support strategic initiatives with a wide array of institutions through sharing of human and financial resources.

FONTAGRO-funded initiatives generate concrete solutions, with results that can be adopted by end users.

FONTAGRO-funded projects have a positive impact on increasing economic returns, reducing production costs, and adding value.

Seventy-four percent of results generated by FONTAGRO are considered regional public goods.

For every dollar invested by FONTAGRO, cofinancing organizations and participating entities contribute five dollars, 3.7 of which are matching funds.

FONTAGRO brings together a network of researchers, scientists, and professionals who—through research, technology, innovation, and comprehensive and participatory approaches promote concrete results with high social and economic impact on farming families in Latin America and the Caribbean.

OUR RESULTS AND IMPACT

FONTAGROfunded projects have successfully generated:

Examples: more productive, new varieties of crops; techniques to adapt to and mitigate climate change; new ways of participating and organizing markets and value chains; and several other innovations generated and supported since FONTAGRO was established.

4 new technologies at the global level 69% of cases: Project results have been adopted by end users. 77% of cases: Results were incorporated into national research and innovation systems. The investments made by FONTAGRO play an important role in generating knowledge and new technologies, and significantly impact training.

AGRICULTURAL INNOVATION

FONTAGRO focuses its activities on agricultural innovation, which is defined as "a participatory process through which individuals or organizations generate and use technological, organizational, and institutional knowledge that results in new goods and services, which, once used by society, generate social, economic, environmental, and cultural benefits."

OUR PARTNERSHIPS



Joint efforts with the Ministry for Primary Industries of New Zealand to implement new livestock feeding technologies to increase productivity and help reduce greenhouse gas emissions.



Agreement with the Global Environment Facility (GEF) and the IDB to develop technology transfer mechanisms and support networks to adapt to and mitigate climate change in Latin America and the Caribbean. Agreement with CGIAR (Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research) to strengthen research and capacitybuilding projects in member countries.


